Although our school year got off to a rough start with a cyber ransomware attack that affected all technological systems, our systems have now been restored. Our focus this year remains on supporting our students academically, socially, and emotionally as we work to accelerate learning for all. We've been working hard to address learning gaps and offer supports to help our students achieve success as we rebound from a few challenging years. I'm proud to share that the data we have so far this year indicates we're on the right track. The Commonwealth of Pennsylvania recently released the Future Ready PA Index, which rates schools on their achievement and academic growth. With a score of 95.7/100, I'm proud to share McCormick is the highest scoring elementary school in the state. We have many high performing schools in our state, and this is the first time a Moon Area school has achieved this distinction. Congratulations to the faculty, staff, and students at McCormick!

Another exciting update is that three of our schools have been recognized by the state for implementing School-wide Positive Behavior Interventions and Support (PBIS) Tier 1 to fidelity. Congratulations to Bon Meade, Brooks, and Hyde Elementary Schools!

Last year, I shared that we were expecting significant growth within our school district. We've already seen some development and are expecting another 6-7 new communities. The new developments will include single family homes, townhomes, and apartments. As our community grows, we will have to make modifications to ensure we are able to meet the needs of all students. This includes the redistricting of our elementary schools. We are also in the process of making modifications to our high school, middle school, and athletic facilities to accommodate this growth.

I'd like congratulate Dr. Jeff Beltz on being named the Superintendent of Hopewell School District. Dr. Beltz has been an asset to our district as our Assistant Superintendent. I'd like to thank him for supporting our students and schools and wish him well in his next endeavor.



Moon Area School District received \$2,284,082 in ARP ESSER funding. District spent \$791,459.74 in 21-22 school year. This year, the District is using available funds in ARP ESSER to fund after school and before school remediation programs, mental health support, and technology supplies. The District has until 9/30/2024 to spend all ARP ESSER funds.

COMMUNITY GROWTH

With 6-7 new developments expected to be built in our community, Moon Area School District will continue to see significant growth. Davis Demographics is completing a growth study to determine how many new students our district should expect.

In order to accommodate all students and offer the best possible learning environment, we will continue to evaluate our school buildings and facilities as well as our course offerings and staffing. We will also work to keep our class sizes as consistent as possible across the district. This will likely result in redistricting across our K-5 elementary schools. The findings from the Davis Demographics study will be used to determine our redistricting needs.

As we plan for the future, we will ensure our budget reflects this expected growth, and

SCHOOL SAFETY










School safety and security is a priority at Moon Area School District. The district is committed to partnering with the school community to create a safe environment for all students and staff. In addition, Moon Area School District partnered with the Moon Township Police Department to grow the School Resource Officer (SRO) program.

As part of our school safety program, our students and staff participate in safety trainings and informational programs throughout the year.

SCHOOL RESOURCE OFFICER PROGRAM

Officer Mike Beachy has more than 18 years of law enforcement experience, including 10 years of experience teaching and leading students. As a former United States Marine, Officer Beachy currently serves on the Moon Township Veterans Banner and coordinates Police Department programs such as Santa Cop, Moon Parks Department Spooktacular, and other events. He holds a bachelor's in Ministry Leadership from Lee University.

Officer Cuyler Hale joins the SRO program from the Moon Township Police Department. Officer Hale has more than 11 years of law enforcement experience and is starting his 5th year at Moon Police Department. Upon completion of the Police Academy in 2011 at Indiana University of Pennsylvania, Officer Hale began his law enforcement career with Rochester Borough Police Department. Throughout his career, he has served many different jurisdictions including Beaver Borough and Crescent Township. His career also includes law enforcement experience in an academic environment, including serving as a police officer for Robert Morris University for three years. Officer Hale currently serves as the Vice President for the Moon Township Police Officer's Association and assists in benevolent fundraisers such as food drives for the West Hills Food Pantry.



PUPIL SERVICES

The Moon Area School District Pupil Services Department services a wide variety of student needs throughout the district. The goal of the Pupil Services Department is to assist in carrying out the district's mission of educating every individual in a respectful, safe, enriching environment through comprehensive programs that inspire excellence, lifelong learning, and responsibility.

MASD has 517 students with disabilities receiving supports with an Individualized Education Plan, 173 gifted education students, 108 students with a 504 Service Plan, 247 English Learners, and 45 students who are placed in out-of-district programs.

There are currently seven MASD students who are experiencing homelessness.

SPECIAL EDUCATION

Moon Area School District offers K-12 Life Skills Support classrooms to address the needs of students with disabilities including complex learning profiles. In addition, the district has been consulting with the PaTTAN Autism Initiative ABA (Applied Behavior Analysis) Supports since 2010. The district also provides Emotional Support services via the treatment team model at Bon Meade Elementary School and Moon Area Middle School through a partnership with Wesley Family Services (WFS). A Mental Health Therapist from WFS also provides therapeutic services to support the mental health needs of students at Moon Area High School. This program was designed for students who demonstrate moderate to severe behavioral, social, and emotional needs.















PUPIL SERVICES

ENGLISH LANGUAGE

The district has once again been awarded a grant to help support immigrant students and English Learners through Title III funds for this school year. These funds will be directed to provide an ESL coach to support content teachers who have English Learners in their classrooms. This program offers support to teachers in planning lessons, assignments, and assessments that will make language more comprehensible to the English Learners.

SOCIAL/EMOTIONAL & MENTAL HEALTH

Moon Area School District has many social/emotional and mental health supports in place, some of which include:


- SAP (Student Assistance Program), which is known as MAPS (Moon Assistant Program for Students) in the Moon Area School District, provides services to at-risk students K-12.
- School-based mental health therapists from The Bradley Center service students in all buildings based on referrals made by the MAPS team.
- Peer-to-Peer Program in the high school presents programs directed toward domestic violence and mental health.
- The district has two full-time school psychologists and a graduate level school psychology intern on staff to assist with student mental health issues.
- The school social worker, contracted with the Allegheny Intermediate Unit, provides mental health checks and regular counseling sessions with students identified by school counselors and with parent/guardian permission.





FORMATIVE ASSESSMENTS

One way we can measure how well we are preparing our students is through the use of formative assessments. Collecting meaningful data enables us to see what is working well and where we can improve. This includes participating in statewide testing to see how our schools compare to other schools across the state and the country. It also includes collecting individual student data to determine how we can best meet students where they are academically and push them forward.

The pandemic caused a disruption to data collection across the state. In 2020, schools did not have the chance to administer the PSSAs and Spring Keystone Exams. In 2021, many schools across the country saw a dip in their scores. We believe this is a result of the learning time that was lost due to the pandemic. Another factor is that the data was incomplete in many cases, as not all students took the exam.

The 2022 PSSA and Keystone Exam data was recently published by the Pennsylvania Department of Education (PDE). We are pleased to see that we have made a number of gains in our effort to recover from the pandemic, and we recognize that more work must be done.

MASD BUILDING SCORES

The Commonwealth of Pennsylvania released building-level scores for every public school in the state. The scores reflect the school's performance according to the Future Ready PA Index, which rates schools on their achievement and growth.

In addition, the building-level scores are used for school accountability purposes and serve as one way that schools may reflect upon their performance measures in comparison to others. Overall, our schools performed very well, especially coming out of the pandemic. It's important to note that high school data may not reflect the performance of a full cohort, because students were granted COVID-19 Keystone



Exam exemptions when the 2020 tests were cancelled. Therefore, not all students were required to test. Consequently, comparing Keystone Exam performance among high schools is not always an effective measure due to differing test participation rates.

CONGRATULATIONS



BENCHMARK ASSESSMENTS

ACADIENCE READING SCREENER

MASD uses Acadience reading to identify if students are above or below benchmark and whether they need core support, strategic support or intensive support. The data is used by teachers and administrators to individualize instruction and improve reading outcomes for all students.


MAPS GROWTH ASSESSMENT

The MAP (Measure of Academic Progress) Growth assessments are adaptive tests that help teachers and administrators use data to make informed decisions about how to maximize student achievement and growth.

Because the tests are diagnostic in nature, students are provided with increasingly difficult questions based on their performance as they take the test. The test aims to find the "just right learning level" for each student by finding the spot where a student gets 50% of the questions correct and 50% incorrect.

Based on the difficulty level of that split, students are grouped into score bands that determine which skills students have already mastered and which skills they are ready to learn. The tests are also norm-referenced, which means that a student's performance is compared to a national group of students who take MAP Growth tests.






MOON AREA CLASS OF 2022

SCHOOL-WIDE POSITIVE BEHAVIOR INTERVENTIONS AND SUPPORTS (PBIS)

Each of our elementary schools is engaged in School-wide Positive Behavior Interventions and Supports (PBIS). The intent of PBIS is to encourage and reinforce positive behavior from students by creating school-wide expectations.

"Positive Behavioral Interventions and Supports (PBIS) is an evidence-based, tiered framework for supporting students' behavioral, academic, social, emotional, and mental health. When implemented with fidelity, PBIS improves social emotional competence, academic success, and school climate. It also improves teacher health and wellbeing. It is a way to create positive, predictable, equitable and safe learning environments where everyone thrives." (papbs.org)

The PBIS guiding principles include:

- Every child can learn proper behavior.
- Stepping in early can prevent more serious behavior problems.
- Each child is different and schools need to provide many kinds of behavior support.
- How schools teach behavior should be based on research and science.
- Following a child's behavioral progress is important.
- Schools must gather and use data to make decisions about behavior problems.

POSITIVE BEHAVIOR AT THE HIGH SCHOOL

The High School uses Rachel's Challenge to reinforce positive behavior. In addition, the High School offers Peer to Peer Club. The Peer-to-Peer Club implements activities with students that promote positive behavior and kindness. Character education, leadership, and positivity lessons are completed monthly during homeroom.

In partnership with the Moon Education Foundation, the High School Life Skills Program and Invention Lab students will be constructing a Hydroponics Lab in January 2023.

In November 2022, high school students participated in an assembly called, "One Pill Can Kill" that emphasized the importance of making positive life decisions.

The High School is home to the Shout Club, which is part of the school's diversity, equity and inclusion initiative. This club is an opportunity for students to come together to help make their school a positive environment for all students. They work together to spread kindness, promote acceptance and ensure all students feel a sense of belonging at school.





POSITIVE BEHAVIOR AT THE MIDDLE SCHOOL

At the Middle School, each grade level has a positive behavior support plan. The students do monthly activities focusing on team building, problem solving and collaboration. One student from each team every month is selected as "Student of the Month." Those students have demonstrated positive character traits such as being kind, hardworking, trustworthy, considerate, and helpful. The principals deliver yard signs to celebrate the students of the month!

In the spring semester, the Middle School hosts "Girls Night Out," which helps prepare students for the transition to high school. The girls participate in breakout group activities, talk about issues they are facing and send positive messages to one another.

As part of an effort to recognize the importance of diversity, equity and inclusion, the Middle School is home to the Holla Club. This club promotes kindness, acceptance and belonging at school. Its mission is aligned to the Shout Club at the High School.

Casa San Jose, a non-profit Latino Immigrant Resource Center, provides a mentoring program for Latino students at the Middle School. The Casa San Jose mentors meets weekly with students to help motivate and support them with school and other aspects of their lives. The program is designed to empower students while embracing and feeling proud of their Latino heritage.





REGIONAL CAREER FAIR

Moon Area School District hosted a regional career fair for students in grades 10-12. The 22-23 Career Fair featured 76 companies with approximately 125 professionals in attendance. In addition to about 935 Moon Area School District students, approximately 210 students from five local high schools participated. BATTLE OF THE BOOKS

Each year, MASD students in grades 3-5 have the opportunity to participate in Battle of the Books through the Moon Township Public Library. In addition to students, teachers also participate. It's a great learning opportunity and a lot of fun!

SPELLING BEE

Moon Area School District partnered with the Moon Rotary to make the Spelling Bee an annual event for third grade. The morning begins with parents and family of the Spelling Bee Homeroom Representatives and Alternates, as well as the elementary principals seated in the Moon Area Middle School Auditorium to cheer each of the third-grade classrooms as they arrive. The high energy event has music playing during the welcome, absolute silence as the word is given to the contestant, and then children waving signs and cheering for the homeroom representatives as they spell a word correctly. Not only is it a great opportunity for the students who are in the spelling bee, it's also a lot of fun for everyone else who gets to watch and cheer on their friends!

















NEW CURRICULUM, TEXTBOOKS, AND LEARNING MATERIALS

MASD remains committed to adopting and implementing relevant, rigorous, and carefully selected materials knowing that instructional materials have a direct impact on student learning outcomes.

Newly adopted materials were implemented in the 2022-2023 school year and included high quality resources for the ELA, Social Studies, Business, and Health departments.

All student materials are carefully screened by department teachers and administrators prior to board approval and are open for public review for 30 days.





SMART FUTURES

MASD's commitment to full implementation of Pennsylvania Career Education and Work Standards continues to grow! Beginning with the 2022-2023 school year, Moon Area students in grades K-8 will engage in career exploration activities through the SmartFutures online portal using their Clever accounts. High school students continue their work in the CEW standards

using the Naviance system. Students begin by participating in surveys and learning activities that bring self-awareness to their earliest aspirations. From there, they explore careers that match their goals while receiving guidance from an eMentor, their teachers, and their school counselors. Finally, students are matched with relevant programs and majors helping to identify schools, colleges, and workforce opportunities providing a best match to for their future success!













PROFESSIONAL LEARNING OPPORTUNITIES

MASD continues to build teacher capacity in areas of best practices, differentiated instruction, and preparing all students for college and career readiness. Through essential development opportunities, Moon Area teachers continue to learn and grow by supporting our students through refinement of their instructional skills.

In the 2022-2023 school year, MASD has made the commitment to our teachers to provide meaningful and ongoing learning opportunities. In addition to specific grade level and content area focus trainings, our teachers are participating in LETRS training Language Essentials for Teachers of Reading and Spelling.

All teachers in grades K-2, along with English Language and Learning Support teachers, are participating in the LETRS professional learning program that is rooted in the science of reading. This on-going professional learning experience empowers teachers to help students excel at reading.

For the 2022-2023 school year, Moon Area math teachers are participating in math academies. The first academy is in partnership with Carnegie Learning and the second academy is in partnership with the Allegheny Intermediate Unit. Both academies provide five full-day workshops modeling in a learning-centered environment and fostering conceptual understanding of mathematics learning.

STEAM teachers are participating in yearlong professional learning focused on the natural connections between Science, Technology, Engineering, the Arts, and Mathematics.

Starting with first grade teachers, and in partnership with The University of Oregon and the Rand Corporation, MASD is implementing teaching routines designed to increase the effectiveness of reading instruction. Enhanced Core Reading Instruction (ECRI) is a multi-tiered program supporting our core materials for our youngest learners.













PERFORMING AND VISUAL ARTS

MASD ALL-DISTRICT MUSIC CONCERT

In March of 2022, the MASD Music Department held its 14th Annual All-District Music Concert titled "The Magic of Mowtown." This concert represented over 350 students from all school buildings, with students in grades fourth through twelfth performing in a continuous musical extravaganza in the MAHS Auditorium. The show coincided with the National Association for Music Education declaring March "Music In Our Schools Month."

MASD ELEMENTARY MUSIC

All MASD elementary students have the opportunity to perform in winter and spring concerts each year. In addition, several elementary music students performed at the Moon Area Education Foundation Moonlit 5K and Pittsburgh Youth Chorus' winter and spring concerts.

In addition to performing, elementary music includes many cross-curricular music activities. Third grade students learn skip counting songs while fourth grade students learn a state and capital song. These songs help students remember important information for their other classes. More educational songs will be added as the year progresses.

MASD MIDDLE SCHOOL MUSIC

Moon Area Middle School band, orchestra, and choir students perform in grade-level winter and spring concerts each year. In addition, Middle School Vocal Chamber Ensemble performs in several community events around the holidays.

MASD HIGH SCHOOL MUSIC

The MAHS Honors Choir traveled to New York City in the spring of 2022 to perform at the Basilica of St. Patrick's Old Cathedral and participated in a workshop with conductor Judith Clurman. Three singers from this ensemble qualified for the PMEA District and Region Chorus, and one student went on to qualify for PMEA All-State Chorus. The MAHS Singer Booster Organization sponsored a variety of educational and social events including a masterclass with Dr. Charles Dugan, Jacob Khalil Concert, and the Spring Choir Banquet. In support of Breast Cancer Awareness, the MAHS Combined Choirs performed the National Anthem and Alma Mater with the 8th Grade Choir at the varsity football "Pink Out" game.

In addition, two seniors were selected to perform in the 2022 PMEA All-State Music Festival during the 2021-2022.

MAHS MARCHING BAND

With a score of 91.575 (their highest yet), the Moon Area Marching Band earned first place in Class 3A at the PIMBA Championships! In addition, they earned third place overall! The band also won the best Music and Visual Performance and Overall Effect awards.






MASD DISTINGUISHED ALUMNI
