

The February 11, 2013, meeting of the Moon Area Board of Education was held in the High School Board Meeting Room, 7:00 p.m., for general purposes. The meeting was CALLED TO ORDER by President Sandra McCurdy. The following directors were present:

Superintendent's Report – Dr. Milanovich

Dr. Milanovich spoke about the Tiger Spirit Award focusing on honoring positive character traits and recognizes students for personal achievements and excellent classroom behaviors that often reach beyond academics. Thank you to our award sponsors, Clearview Federal Credit Union and Penguin Bookshop. For February, our two award recipients are from Hyde Elementary School, fourth grader Alyssa Haydon and second grader Hunter Wilson.

First recognized was Alyssa Haydon, nominated by Mr. DiFiore. Alyssa embodies what it means to be a Moon Tiger, and demonstrates a number of wonderful qualities. She takes pride in all of the work that she completes, and in the way she respects all of her peers and staff members at Hyde. Finance Committee – Mr. Olszewski

The Finance Committee discussed the following items:

2014-2018 Tax Collector Compensation

Mr. Bennett reviewed the proposed compensation plans for the school district's two elected real estate tax collectors. The matter will be considered at the February 11, 2013 school board meeting.

Food Service Management RFP for 2013-2014

Mr. Bennett informed the committee that the school district will not need to issue an RFP for next year's food service management services.

Friends and Family Energy Program

Mr. Bennett reviewed the First Energy Friends and Family program that is being offered through the AIU electricity purchasing consortium. The program enables individuals to purchase their electricity supply for their resident at a discounted price. The individual can designate the AIU school district of their choice to receive a \$10 participation fee. The committee also discussed the concept of using the participation fee to fund an educational foundation that would benefit Moon students.

Mr. Heck reviewed the revised five year capital reserve fund expenditure plan.

Policy Committee – Mrs. Schisler

The policy committee met on Feb. 4, 2013 regarding discussion of the following policies:

Discussion of Potential New Policies or Policy Revisions

- Policy 122 – Extracurricular Activities (Revision)
- Policy 123 – Interscholastic Athletics (Revision)
- Policy 123.1 – Concussion Management (New)
(Includes Listed Forms)

The district is currently implementing the requirements stated in the above policies regarding concussion management. We need to formalize them and include them in our manual in accordance with state law.

The above policies will be presented and discussed in depth at the February 25th work session meeting when Mr. Ricci Rich is present to explain them in detail.

- Policy 201 – Admission of Students (Revision)
- Policy 216 – Student Records (MASD Current Policy)
- Policy 216 – Student Records (PSBA Recommended Policy)

Mr. Haslett explained that Policies 201 and 216, Student Records, will be ready for a first reading pending a final review by administration and the solicitor.

- Policy 800 – Electronic Records Retention (MASD Current Policy)
- Policy 800 – Records Management (PSBA Recommended Policy)
- 800 AR – Administration Regulation (new)

Policies 800 – Electronic Records Retention and Records Management have been under lengthy review by the technology and policy committees and the solicitor. AR 800 (Administration Regulation) is being finalized by the Technology Committee. This package will be ready for a first reading in February. An AR is a procedure that is established by administration in order to implement a policy. An AR does not need board approval for ongoing revisions.

Policies Ready for First Reading – Presented on Board Agenda

- Policy 913.2 – Commercial Advertising on School Property (new)

Policies presented to the board for first reading on February 4: 913.1 Facilities Naming (new for adoption) and 913.2 – Commercial Advertising on School Property (new for adoption). Policy 913.1 was approved and will be presented at the February 11 Board Meeting for the second reading.

Policy 913.2 Commercial Advertising on School Property was discussed at the committee meeting. The affect the policy has on booster club activities for advertising and fundraising was brought up, and that will be clarified prior to the second reading of that policy.

New Business – the PSBA has sent the first section of the revised policy manual for review and adoption. The district entered into an agreement last year (June 11, 2012) with PSAB for a review and update of our policy manual. We will begin the review once we have placed our new policies and revisions on the agenda for first readings.

Student Activities Committee – Mr. Olszewski

Legislation Committee – Mr. Bussard

The House Education Committee reported these bills of interest:

HB 19, which requires school districts to incorporate an age-appropriate child exploitation awareness education program for students in grades K-8.

HB 75, which prohibits the Tax Reform Code to allow individual career and technical education schools to be eligible to receive business donations with the Educational Improvement Tax Credit (EITC) program.

HB 111, which establishes elements to be contained in the State Board of Education's master plan for higher education. The legislation replaces the current eight requirements of the plan with 5 new requirements.

The House Children & Youth and Judiciary Committees conducted a joint meeting to discuss the Child Protection Task Force Report. The House Judiciary Committee is expected to consider bills related to some of the recommendations next month.

In Senate action this week, the Senate Judiciary Committee passed Senate Resolution 6, which directs the Joint State Government Commission to study the issue of violence prevention, to establish an advisory committee and conduct a thorough review and comprehensive analysis of the underlying causes of violent crime, including mass shootings. The final report, due December 31, 2013.

The PSBA submitted testimony to the Senate Republican Policy Committee regarding issues related to special education funding and challenges facing school districts. The testimony explained that special education costs are driven by the requirements of the Individuals with Disabilities Education Act (IDEA), Pennsylvania regulations (which cover gifted as well as disabled students), and the unique needs of the students in each district. PSBA said that the U.S. Congress has never come close to its promise of funding 40% of the costs for IDEA.

Education Secretary Ronald Tomalis denied all eight cyber charter school applications for the 2013-2014 school year, citing significant deficiencies in curriculum, finance and overall operations.

Tomalis said in a news statement, "The proposals submitted by the applicants lack adequate evidence and sufficient information of how prospective students would be offered academic programs."

This week Gov. Tom Corbett in his budget unveiled two significant education proposals as follows:

Governor Proposes "Passport for Learning" Block Grant Funded Through Liquor Privatization

The Governor plans for the privatization of liquor and wine sales, with the revenue from the auction of liquor licenses to be used for a proposed new "Passport for Learning" block grant that would provide \$1 billion to public schools over the next four years. The grant will focus on four priority areas: school safety, enhanced early education programs, individual learning and science, technology, engineering and mathematics (aka STEM) courses and programs.

The Pension Reform Plan – A Framework for Success

The plan recognizes that the commonwealth cannot correct its pension problem all at once. Significant changes are required to make real and lasting pension reform. The commonwealth will institute and taper taxpayer contributions.

Components of the pension reform plan:

- New employees will be enrolled in a 401(a) plan. Enrollment in the plan will be automatic and employees will be required to contribute at least 6.25% (7.5% for PSERS members) of their salary to the plan.
- Current employees will not see any changes to any benefits already accrued.
- Future pension benefits for current employees will be reduced through pension compensation reforms, making contribution withdrawals actuarially neutral and reducing the multiplier by .5% for all employees currently above the 2% multiplier level.
- Current employees will be able to contribute a higher amount in order to retain the 2.5 multiplier.
- Retirees will not lose or have any changes to benefits.

Mrs. Tatone asked Mr. Bennett regarding the changes that the governor is attempting to bring to education, how is that compared to what we looked at last week and has that been considered with the preliminary budget? Mr. Bennett responded that the governor’s budget basically proposes to reduce the employer contribution rate. Mr. Bennett said he has not done anything to reflect governor’s proposals in the budget and will make those adjustments. As we approach May and June, we will have a better idea as to what the state budget will be.

Mrs. Tatone commented that the governor is proposing a large amount, highest in history to our district, and asked Mr. Bennett if he knew anything about this. Mr. Bennett responded primarily because of the increased cost in retirement; the Governor’s plan is to give us less state money for retirement and lowering the retirement rate.

Mrs. McCurdy commented that this is the budget we posted, it is preliminary. Mrs. McCurdy would like to make sure everyone understands that that means. Effectively, Mr. Bennett has worked on a preliminary budget, which will be reviewed and approved and sent. She commented that Mr. Bennett has a tremendous amount of work to do between now and June to get the budget where we need to be. Mrs. McCurdy also commented that she will approve this preliminary budget; however, she is not in favor of tax increases even though there are tax increases in the preliminary budget.

Dr. Milanovich commented that she thinks it is imperative that the board consider raising taxes. She said that we haven’t raised taxes in four years. Costs have been increasing and we want to be able to keep our level of service to our children. We have a lot of decisions that we have to make on buildings, as far as our elementary schools, all of that takes money. Moon Township was named one of the most desirable places to live and especially for retirees because housing is

reasonable here. The District really needs to look at raising taxes and taking the exception for pension. We are going to get to a point where we have used all of our resources and we have nothing to fall back on. In an Act 1 environment, you will never be able to build up your fund balance again. Dr. Milanovich thinks it's really important for the board members and public to understand that. And she hopes that the board members will keep an open mind as we go through this process and really protect what we have here for our students.

On a roll call vote, the following directors voted in favor: Mrs. McCurdy, Mr. Bussard and Mr. Tranter and the following directors voted in disfavor: Mr. Steele, Mrs. Schisler, Mr. Testa, Mrs. Tatone, Mr. Harbaugh. This motion did not pass.

Mrs. McCurdy asked Mr. Bennett what is the implication of this? Mr. Bennett responded that this takes us to the discussion of referendum exceptions. If you do not approve a preliminary budget that shows you need a tax increase in excess of the index, you do not qualify for applying for any referendum exceptions.

Dr. Milanovich would really like the board to reconsider what they just did, because if in fact you want to make good business decisions, you need to keep your options open. If you don't take this exception given to you because the Governor knows that pensions will increase, if you disregard that, that you will not be able to pull upon it later on. A good business move would be to reconsider the option. You don't have to use it, but you are effectively taking the option away and haven't even looked at budget.

Mr. Bennett pointed out that the budget with no tax increase, if his estimates are reasonably accurate, this budget is out of balance by almost \$2.5 million dollars without any tax increases. If you want to apply for any exception, you have to approve the preliminary budget as is.

Mrs. McCurdy asked if anyone wanted to reconsider vote. No comment from board members.

Tax Collector Compensation Plans

IT WAS MOVED by Mr. Steele, SECONDED by Mr. Bussard, "that the Board of Education approve the attached compensation plans for the school district's elected real estate tax collectors for years 2014 through 2018."

All directors voted in favor on a voice vote.

All directors voted in favor on a voice vote.

Nicole Falbo Memorial

IT WAS MOVED by Mr. Tranter, SECONDED by Mr. Testa, “that the Board of Education approve the plan to re-establish the Nicole Falbo Memorial, as attached.”

All directors voted in favor on a voice vote.

Change Orders for High School to Middle School Conversion Project

IT WAS MOVED by Mrs. Tatone, SECONDED by Mr. Harbaugh, “that the Board of Education approve approve the change orders related to the middle school project for an increased cost of \$4,996.72.”

Mr. Steele asked for someone to explain why we are taking out perfectly good faucets and for what purpose? Brian Faulkerson responded that the way it was designed, the automatic faucets, when you put your hands under there, it’s an automatic temperature, you can’t get scolded, it’s for hygienic reasons. There are two or three sinks in nurse’s suite. The nurse would like to be able to control the water.

Mr. Harbaugh questioned about the gas line. Carrie Crawford said she didn’t want to waste any more time; they have spent two days digging and came up with nothing. Gas line cannot be shut off yet. Until spring break happens and gas can be shut off and run test for gas line, there’s no point in wasting time or money to trace it to get back to valves where they are located.

Mr. Testa asked if we will get a refund on this, looks as if we are paying twice. Carrie Crawford responded that it depends on when and if they find anything. Carrie has been looking into this and will report back to the board.

On a roll call vote, the directors voted as follows: Mrs. McCurdy, Mr. Steele, Mrs. Schisler, Mr. Bussard, Mr. Harbaugh voted in favor of Change Order GC3-2 and Mr. Testa, Mrs. Tatone and Mr. Tranter voted in disfavor of Change Order GC3-2. Motion passes.

Mr. Bussard voted in favor of Change Order PC-42. Mrs. McCurdy, Mr. Steele, Mrs. Schisler, Mr. Testa, Mrs. Tatone, Mr. Harbaugh and Mr. Tranter voted in disfavor of Change Order PC-42. Motion does not pass.

Refrigerator Purchases – Brooks & Hyde

IT WAS MOVED by Mr. Bussard, SECONDED by Mrs. Tatone, “that the Board of Education authorize the purchase of two (2) reach-in refrigerators to replace the non-functioning refrigerators at Brooks & Hyde elementary schools. The total cost of \$4,461 will be charged to the Food Service Fund.”

All directors voted in favor on a voice vote.

Capital Reserve Fund Expenditure Plan

All directors voted in favor on a voice vote.

This Checkin system will allow us to scan the license and do a criminal background check immediately and will print a badge that the visitor will wear while he/she is in the building and then they will back to office to pick up their license and return the badge. This is just another level of security we are trying to introduce.
